Grizzly bears can be dangerous.
Here are some backcountry tips.

- 🐻 Bears like ...
 - ... a quiet life.
 - ... food.
 - ... nice smells.



- 🐻 Bears dislike ...
 - ... surprises.



What you should do:

- 🐻 Talk or sing when you are hiking.
- 🐻 Carry a small bell, or wear it on your boot.
- 🐻 Test and carry a flashlight at night.
- 🐻 At night put all food in a bag.
- 🐻 Leave no bags on the ground.
Hang them high between two trees.
- 🐻 Put soap and deodorant in the bag too.

What you shouldn't do:

- 🐻 Don't leave food in your tent.
- 🐻 Don't keep snacks in your car at night.
- 🐻 Don't leave garbage near your tent.
- 🐻 Don't cook near your tent.

If you meet a grizzly:

- 🐻 Don't run.
- 🐻 Speak to the bear.
- 🐻 Leave your backpack for the bear.
- 🐻 Walk backwards.
- 🐻 Climb a tree if you can.

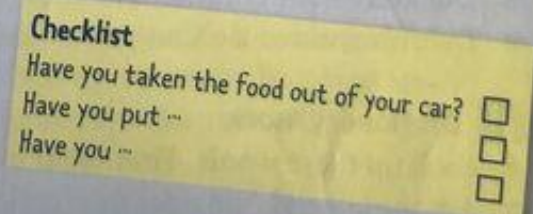

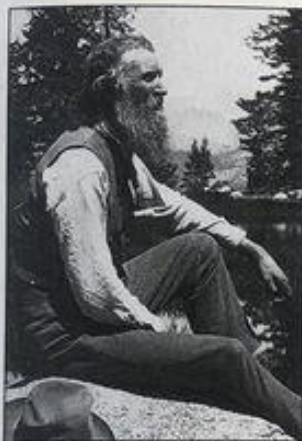

Some famous Americans



John Muir was born in Scotland in 1838, but went to live in America. He loved the fantastic American landscapes. His campaigns for national parks were very important, and his books about nature and the environment are still popular today.



Lewis and Clark made the first journey across America to the Pacific coast. They traveled from 1804–1806. They went along the rivers and over high mountains. The long journey across the country, with its strange animals, was hard and often dangerous. They had many adventures and met Native Americans who often helped them.



Betsy Ross is famous as the woman who made the first American flag. A new country needed a new flag.

George Washington drew one. Betsy Ross made a flag but cut different, easier stars with her scissors. In 1777 the first *Stars and Stripes* was born.



Sally Ride was a very successful tennis player when she was young. But she was interested in science too. She informed herself about space travel. In 1977 she became Dr Sally Ride. In 1983 she was the first American woman astronaut. She worked for NASA. She has written some books about space for young people too.



Rosa Parks lived in Alabama. When she was a young woman, black people on buses only sat at the back of the bus. One day in 1955 Rosa Parks sat on a seat for white people. The police came and they arrested her.

A bus boycott began as a protest. After a year, the black customers won. Rosa Parks helped black people get the same rights as white people. When she died in 2005 people all over America remembered her.



Steve Jobs (left) was born in California in 1955. His parents didn't have much money, but after high school Steve Jobs went to college. He was bored there and left after only a few months. But he was interested in computer programs and games. With two friends he made a small computer in his parents' garage. Then they started making computers for a local shop. They became a very big and successful American company. Steve Jobs became famous as a pioneer of the personal computer. The company has been very successful with a popular MP3 player too.
